MUSIC The International Sweethearts of Rhythm faced both racism and sexism. As an all-female swing band, they constantly fought, not always successfully, against being labeled a novelty act. A racially integrated band, they toured segregated areas. The white musicians darkened their faces and hid to avoid arrest; all lived on their bus to avoid segregated facilities. Black-and-white footage and stills from the 1940s, intercut with contemporary interviews in color, tell the band's story. From its origins at a private school in Mississippi, the band moved to Washington, D.C., adding more experienced musicians, occasionally playing with stars, and making a USO tour for black troops after World War II. As with so many women who moved into "men's" jobs, they found their opportunities eliminated when the war ended.

These women have a fascinating sto-

ry that needs to be told. This film,

despite some minor sound dropouts,

tells it effectively. Recommended for

collections of jazz, black studies, or

women's studies that can afford it.
